Each year we have some services that highlight the issues and the ideas of LGBTQ people. This year, we will spend some time working together to renew our status as a Welcoming Congregation with the UUA. We can all benefit from becoming better informed about this timely and valuable topic.

- Register college students on campus as well as high school students who will be 18 by November 2020

The 2020 election cycle is a benchmark—not an endpoint—in our long-term work toward justice. No matter the outcome on November 4, there will be much work to do to help move the country forward. Let's #VoteLove.
